YEAR END REPORT ▶ Charlie Stiegelmeier Chief of Police

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Like many other police departments across the country, 2022 proved to be a challenging year for the Miami Township Police Department. We were faced with the challenge of hiring and retaining quality police officers to serve the community. We said hello to several new faces and said goodbye to several old friends.

In 2022, the police department was able to expand the use of modern technology. We implemented the electronic traffic ticket program and upgraded the electronic traffic accident program to reduce the time officers were kept from patrolling the township. These programs were state funded and came at no cost to the taxpayers. We added a background fingerprinting station allowing the police department to offer civilian background checks to the residents of Miami Township. In 2022, the police department continued to excel in their community outreach programs.

Our National Night Out program was third in the nation, and we continued connecting with the community with the Shop with a Hero, Austin Landing Christmas Tree Lighting, Trunk or Treat, and other community outreach programs.

2023 will undoubtedly provide unique challenges for the Miami Township Police Department. Our top priority is to provide quality police services and to maintain a safe community for people to live and visit. I am honored to have the opportunity to serve as your Police Chief.

We provide a level of service based on personal sacrifice and a true devotion to justice.

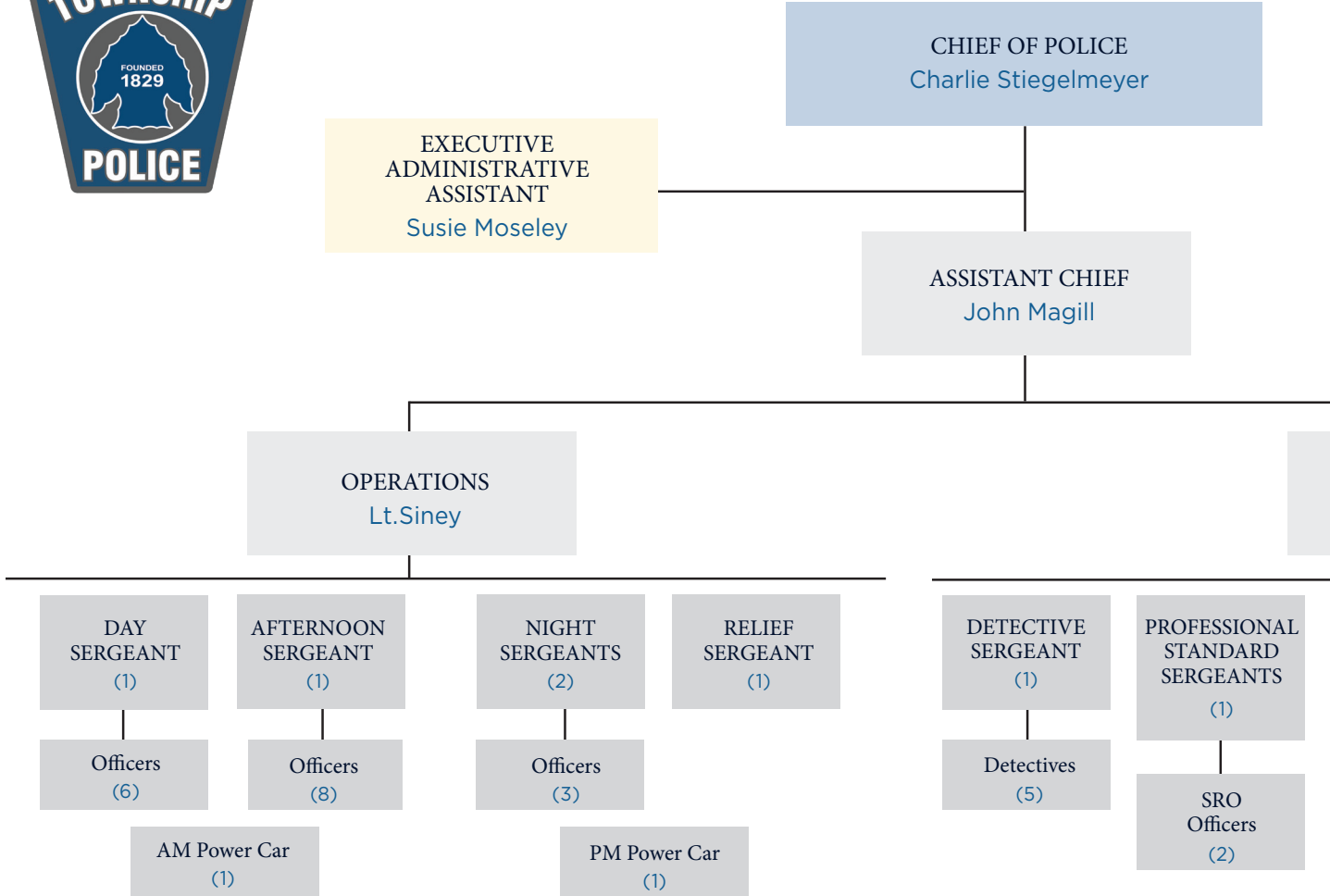
Dedication: We are empowered to unwavering service to the community through humble service, forward thinking and a strong desire to be seen as role models for the residents of Miami Township.

CALEA/OHIO COLLABORATIVE



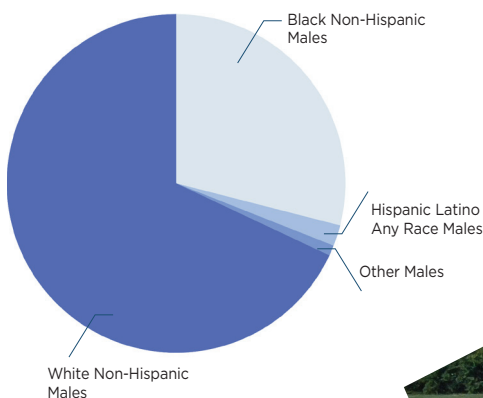

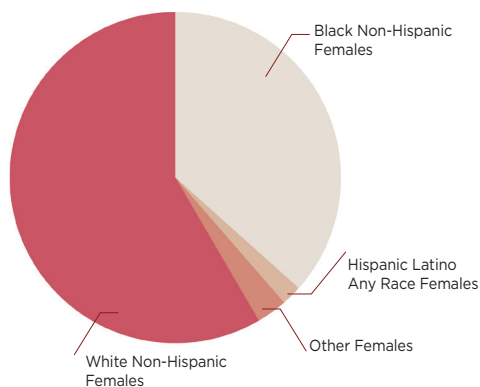

School Resource Officer James Swearingen is going on his third year at Dayton Christian School. Officer Swearingen has created positive connections and rapport with students, staff, and the Dayton Christian community. This relationship has allowed him to embrace the role of law-related counselor and mentor at many school levels. Ofc. Swearingen walks the halls giving students a highfive, welcoming many in the crosswalk during morning arrival and in the lunchroom, ensuring it is safe for the students to have an enjoyable time. He understands being seen and available is vital to the success of the Officer program. Officer Swearingen can also be found in the classroom, talking with students about safety measures they

can take on and off campus. He provides them with common sense ideas to understand their surroundings and what to do if they need help.

On the flip side of the job, Officer Swearingen constantly evaluates the security measures utilized at Dayton Christian School. Since his time on campus, he has increased the number of cameras, adjusted the viewing areas to improve safety, and added more electronic control points to better secure the educational side during after-hours events. Officer Swearingen is also upgrading other locations in and outside of the school to ensure the safety and security of the Dayton Christian family, including all our guests.



As the SRO for the second year at Miamisburg Middle

School, Jane Chance Elementary, and Maddux Lang Preschool, Officer Albert certainly has his hands full. Officer Albert provides expert knowledge in many areas of security to students, including internet safety. Additionally, Officer Albert educates middle school students on citizens' primary responsibilities and interactions with law enforcement. Officer Albert discusses bus safety, crosswalk safety, and getting good restorative sleep during the night for our elementary and preschool students. Identifying the need, Miamisburg Middle Schools installed vape detectors in most of the bathrooms and locker rooms. These detectors can alert for vaping, load, or excessive noise and help alerts. Additional upgrades are continuing to be added to the school to aid in the security of our students.

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Detective Sergeant Jay Phares has been with the Miami Township Police Department since 1990. He has served as a Patrol Officer, Detective, Community Resource Officer, Staff Sergeant, Patrol Sergeant, and Acting Chief of Police. Sergeant Phares has completed Crime Prevention Levels I & II at the University of Louisville National Crime Prevention Institute and has completed several leadership training courses, including Supervisor Training and Education Program (STEP), Police Executive Leadership College (PELC), and the Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE) program.

Sergeant Phares earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Wright State University and is a proud veteran of the Persian Gulf War, where he served as a Sergeant in the United States Army. During his career,

Sergeant Phares was awarded the 2003 Montgomery County Chiefs of Police Officer of the Year, 2007 Ohio Crime Prevention Practitioner of the Year, 2018 Miami Township Police Employee of the Year, and 2022 Montgomery County Township Association Employee of the Year.

Detective Bobby Johnson has been a sworn law enforcement officer for 20 years. Prior to coming to the Miami Township Police Department, Detective Johnson served with the Germantown Police Department, Grandview Medical Center Police Department, the Tactical Crimes Suppression Unit (TCSU), Montgomery County RANGE Taskforce, and with the Montgomery County Hostage Negotiations Team (HNT). Detective Johnson is a certified Evidence Technician through the Miami Valley Regional Crime Laboratory and a certified Drone Operator through the Federal Aviation Administration.

Detective Crystal Rankins started her law enforcement career in 2009 at Sinclair Community College. She was later hired by the Miami Township Police Department in 2014. During her career she has served in the Patrol Bureau, Bike Patrol Unit, Evidence Technician, Field Training Officer, Crisis Intervention Specialist and

School Resource Officer. She is now assigned to the detective section working with the Miami Valley Human Trafficking Task Force. Detective Rankins is commissioned as a Special Agent through Ohio Organized Crime Investigations Commission and credentialed as a Task Force Officer through the Department of Homeland Security.

Detective Doug Hesler was hired in Miami Township in May of 2007. Before joining the Miami Township Police Department, Detective Doug Hesler worked for the Perry Township Police Department, the Trotwood Police Department, and the Village of New Lebanon. Detective Hesler has received advanced training as an Evidence Technician with additional training specific to shooting reconstruction and blood stain patterning analysis and has training in traffic crash investigations, criminal and narcotic interdiction, and clandestine methamphetamine lab identification. Detective Hesler has been assigned to the K-9 Unit and has been an OPOTA unit instructor throughout his career.

Detective Ethan Bens came to the Miami Township Police Department in 2019. Before joining the Miami Township Police Department, Detective Bens worked for the Carlisle Police Department for eight years, where he was assigned to the Patrol Bureau.

In 2019 he was placed in charge of the detective section serving as the Det. Sgt. In 2020 he was promoted to Lieutenant and is currently the Operations Lieutenant. Lt. Siney is a graduate of Columbia Southern University, Supervisor Training Education Program. (STEP), Police Executive Leadership College (PELC), Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE), and The Southern Police Institute (SPI).

I am proud of the Operations Division's accomplishments in 2022. During the year, we

focused on putting the community at the forefront of everything we do. With a community first mindset, the police department will continue to increase participation and find new ways to provide professional services to the residents of Miami Township.

My vision is to lead with integrity, fairness, humility, and clear, honest communication. To mentor and inspire my team through empowerment and delegation while emphasizing an enjoyable professional working environment. I aim to lead with compassion and empathy, focusing more on my teammates and their success.

In 2022, the Miami Township Police Department maintained several initiatives to serve the residents of the Miami Township Community. Initiatives like our drone program continue to grow, with (2) more operators added in 2022. Our drone program is utilized in various ways, including missing person searches, crimes in progress, and accident investigations. Our Bicycle Patrol Unit is another initiative we continued to develop in 2022. We trained new bicycle patrol officers and updated our bike patrol equipment. Finally, we continued to leverage technology using the

Flock camera program. These cameras have helped solve crimes occurring in Miami Township and other jurisdictions throughout the Miami Valley area.

The best way to illustrate the Miami Township Police Department's commitment to the community is through the work ethic of the officers assigned to the Operations Division. These 16 officers are responsible for patrolling the streets 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They handle all calls for service and patrol our community deterring crime and offering assistance to those in need. We will continue to work with our community and find ways to make Miami Township a safe and prosperous community.

PATROL SERGEANTS

The Miami Township Police operations division includes five Road Patrol Sergeants:



Sergeant Fiebig started her career in 2007. She became an Evidence Technician in 2009 and now oversees the Evidence program for the police department. In 2015, Sgt. Fiebig became a Field Training Officer. Sergeant Fiebig has completed First Line Supervision training, the Supervision Training and Education Program (STEP), and the Police Executive Leadership College (PELC).



Sergeant Wooddell has been with the Miami Township Police Department since 2011 and was promoted to sergeant in 2021. During his employment, Sergeant Wooddell has held the roles of Evidence Technician, EVOC Driving

Instructor, and Field Training Officer. In 2022 Sgt. Wooddell graduated from the Supervisor Training Educational Program (STEP).



Sergeant Nienhaus joined the department in 2000. Promoted to sergeant in 2005, he is currently the longest-serving sergeant in the department and has been assigned to the Detective Bureau and Patrol Bureau. Sgt. Nienhaus has attended the Supervisor Training and Education Program (STEP) and is a John Glenn Public Leadership Academy graduate.



Sergeant Swallen started his career in law enforcement in the Village of Batavia in 2005. In 2010, he joined the Miami Township Police Department and in 2020 he was promoted to sergeant. Sgt. Swallen

holds a bachelor's degree with a focus in law enforcement and is a graduate of the Supervisor Training and Education Program (STEP).



Sergeant Scott Miller has served in the Miami Township Police Department since November 2005 and promoted to sergeant in August 2022. Before joining the Miami Township Police Department, Sergeant Miller served in the U.S. Army and Ohio Army National Guard, where he retired in 2015 with 25 years of service. Sergeant Miller's Military Service included four combat deployments to Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iraq, and Afghanistan. Sergeant Miller's military awards include the Combat Action Badge, Army Commendation, and Army Achievement Medals. GRANTS RECEIVED

Chief Stiegemeyer believes in finding alternative ways to fund important initiatives in the department. One way he accomplishes this is through federal and state grant opportunities.

In 2022, the Miami Township Police Department was awarded three grants for equipment or services that police levy funds normally funded. The first grant the department received was \$51,000.00. The Ohio Department of Public Safety sponsored this traffic safety grant. This grant was used to pay officers to patrol township streets looking for impaired drivers and to focus on traffic issues such as OVI, texting while driving, seatbelt usage, and excessive speed.

The other two grants the department received were a federal grant from the Department of Justice and a state grant from the Ohio Attorney General's Office. Both grants were used to help purchase and replace bullet-proof vests for police officers.

TECH REPORT

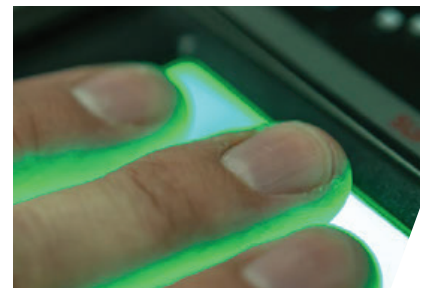


Using technology to improve service to the residents of Miami Township is something Chief Stiegemeyer emphasizes as part of his administration. He is interested in “working smarter” and encourages using technology as part of officer safety and providing the best, most efficient service to the community.

As part of our commitment to provide the highest level of law enforcement service to our community, MTPD understands the importance of a progressive mindset. In 2022, the police department transitioned to E-Citation and E-Crash. This system makes officers more efficient in completing paperwork, allowing them to return to patrol activities quickly. MTPD transitioned from the

old paper and pen Field Training Officer program to PowerFTO. PowerFTO tracks officer performance, assists in developing training programs for new officers and provides performance evaluations for all officers. PowerFTO analyzes officer data to make informed, defensible decisions to aid officers in long-term professional growth.

In 2022, the Miami Township Police Department participated in the following community outreach events:

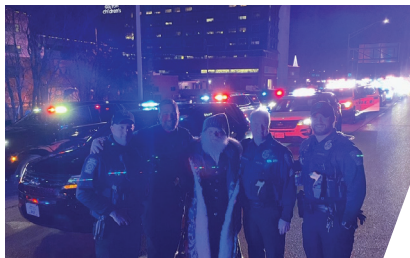
NATIONAL NIGHT OUT
